#### **COVID-19 THROUGH MY TEACHER LENS**

Typically, educational change happens slowly. An idea becomes a proposal which then takes lots of research, brainstorming, draft proposals, documentation, testing, recommendations, approval, professional development training, and eventually implementation. Teachers are usually skeptical about real change.

March 13 turned our world upside down. We thought we were headed into a relaxing March break. Instead, we were challenged with preparing our students to work from home. We bypassed most of the above steps and implemented a significant change in direction of how education happens. A challenge, an adrenaline rush, and, as teachers and parents together, we had to figure it out on the fly. By March 23, we had most of our students ready and equipped to learn for the next two weeks. Some of it worked well and some of it is still a work in progress, but overall, we had adopted a major educational shift, it was working out, and there was a sense of accomplishment.

Thankfully, we work within a supportive community.

There was little time to rest. The announcement of an extended school closure turned two weeks into six. Now it wasn't about just getting by for a while, it was truly adopting the change. We had to move from "this is short term" to consider and provide lasting quality educational learning opportunities. We had to try understand what was mandatory and what was optional, what was worth doing and what wasn't, what could be done at home and what couldn't, what was enough and what was not. Another challenge. The panic snuck in again.

By the time you read this we will be four weeks, 20 teaching days, into this remote teaching and learning model. I can already tell by our weekly online staff meetings, that teachers are more relaxed about the adjustment. Some routine is setting in and it is good, although I do not wish that remote learning becomes our new model. There are still lots of details to figure out, however, before we panic again, we will enjoy a little routine.

We are not sure what lasting impact this change will have on our traditional model of education. I am sure there will be some. Unanimously, what teachers miss most is the relationships with our students. Google Meet or Zoom Meetings just aren't the same. People were created to be in community. Christian schools were meant to be one of our communities where we grow together, learn from one another, and encourage one another. We pray for the day we can do that in person again.



BOARD REPORT

The board continues to review monthly operating statements to track income and expenses for the current year. Business as usual also includes spring contract review and contract renewal work which is underway for all staff members.

We were pleased to approve the recent enrolment for children from the DesJardine and Merwin families.

Since the move to the Binning Street address the Town of North Perth has requested we consider a Reciprocal Use Agreement. A reciprocal use agreement would see a barter of services of equal/ similar value on both sides. As an example this may include LCS use of the arena for student skating in exchange for North Perth use of the gymnasium for a week of Summer Art or Drama Camp. LCS would maintain the right to approve and limit all activities taking place in our facility and could still arrange rental of the facility over and above any reciprocal events.

The move to town has also included the addition of video surveillance to the school property. A video surveillance policy was drafted and approved, and the appropriate signage is posted to inform the public they may be 'on camera'.

Every year board members have taken the opportunity to visit with staff at the end of June to hear joys, challenges and highlights of the previous school year. This has always been a very busy time for staff as they are wrapping up the school year. As well, when it is time to share these reports at a later board meeting, the summer transition of old & new board members meant that some board members who conducted the staff visits are no longer on the board. To address these issues the board has decided to move the timing of the visits to April. Board members will team up and visit staff, bringing feedback to the May meeting.

Board members Jill VanderWier, Arnold Bosman and Larry Robson will be completing their terms this spring. The board carefully considered nominations for the upcoming term and will present the names of those who have accepted a nomination at the Spring Membership meeting. We also look forward to the planned Gallery Walk at the Spring Membership meeting that will provide direction to the Strategic Plan committee in the coming years.

AND then the world came to a screeching halt!!! The arrival of COVID-19 on the world stage led to the interruption, and then suspension, of almost every familiar activity. March Break came and went, but the students did not return. We followed the public schools in the closing of our doors. Teachers became the learners as they found new and innovative ways to provide lessons to students who had to stay at home. Our staff rose to the challenge and has done

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
