



BOARD REPORT

Since the Spring Membership Meeting, the Board of LCS has returned to in-person, physically distanced meetings in a classroom-sized meeting room. ZOOM had its good points and allowed us to meet as needed through the Spring season, but it feels good, and more productive, to speak face-to-face with fellow board members.

We welcomed new members around the board table and voted as a board for this year's executive members. Family circumstances, however, led to the resignation of board member, and chair, Jon VanDonkersgoed. Following procedure set out within our bylaws, the board appointed Andrea Bootsma to fill the vacancy and complete Jon's term on board (Spring 2021). The LCS membership will have the opportunity to approve this, and other board actions, at the Fall Membership Meeting.

Traditionally, board members meet with all staff in June to gain their feedback on the joys, challenges, and highlights of the past school year. This year board members attempted to meet with staff in driveways, back yard patios or through phone calls to keep this important connection

and input from our teachers and other staff members.

The summer months offered a bit of reprieve for board and staff from the stress of online meeting and learning/teaching; but there was still much uncertainty as to what September might look like. A task force was appointed with representation from a variety of experiences and careers. The School Re-Opening Task Force was instrumental in sifting through governmental and health unit information and recommendations, and drafted a re-opening strategy specific to LCS.

Due to the recent resignations of our administrative assistant as well as custodian, the *Hiring Task Force* was appointed to oversee the hiring of new personnel for these roles. We wish Rita Ann Feenstra and Erin Hollinger well in their new endeavours; and welcome Jessica Playford and Theo VanderGaast to Listowel Christian School.

A third task force, Capital, Bursary, Drive Task Force, was appointed to examine the wrapup of the Capital Campaign, oversee bursary funds received through the capital campaign, and what the resumption of the annual Fall Budget Drive might look like now that the capital campaign pledge collection is nearing completion.

Due to limits on social interactions many regular activities had to be suspended. The annual Kick Off BBQ, the first big LCS community event was canceled. We missed this



Rosalie is a bright blue eyed girl who loves to smile and light up the room.


Cody works for EastGen as the Al24 Specialist. He loves to be outside gardening and doing woodworking projects.


Emily is a stay at home mom who loves to read and sing at any point in the day.

We go to Crossroads Life Church in Harriston and are both involved in the worship team, as well as children's ministry and men's ministry.






























FUNDRAISING COMMITTEE Announcements




