

THE PRINCIPAL'S POST

MAKING LEMONADE

I am sure you heard the saying, "When life gives you lemons, make lemonade". The premise of the saying is that we should make the most of our situations. I have thought a lot about that over the last few months, even a year.

Through the last year of schooling, our situations have changed regularly. In March, we went to remote learning, a totally new experience. Then in September we were back in school, but it looked different. In January, back to remote learning. Now, we find ourselves back in the building with more restrictions. Whatever the circumstances, we are challenged to make the most of it – make lemonade.

When I read the Bible, this past year is not unlike the Biblical story. Throughout Biblical history, Christians have faced unprecedented circumstances. Think of the Israelites in captivity in Egypt, Noah building an ark amongst critics, David's courage facing Goliath, and jumping way ahead to many of Paul's trials in his journeys. Consistently Christians are challenged to adapt and react to changing situations. There is a lot we can learn from these unprecedented times. How did God's people react? What/who carried them through? How did it impact their future? All of life's experiences help us to create the next chapters of the story as we rely on God's care for us.

Life granted us remote teaching. We could have grieved the loss of in-person teaching (and for a while we did) or we could have grasped the lemons and made lemonade. In a staff meeting, I asked the staff to reflect on their recent remote

teaching experiences and consider what worked well and could possibly translate to in-person teaching. Here are some staff reflections:

- Some students worked well while at home with the opportunity to have a parent or older sibling working with them and supporting their learning. That one-on-one support is effective.
- ► We know students are successful when they are being taught and challenged at their own level. We call that differentiated teaching. Remote teaching allowed teachers to work with small groups of students on Zoom, uninterrupted by the distractions of the busy classroom, to focus on learning at their level.
- ▶ Remote learning allowed teachers to work effectively with split classes where the curriculum required separate teaching. Specifically for math, we could work with one class level at a time.
- ▶ I enjoyed the opportunity to invite Katherine VanDonkersgoed into my math class for part of the time. Katherine has been home all year and remote learning equaled the playing field between her and her peers for a while. That was very good!

Although remote learning is not our preference, we can still learn from the experience and become even better teachers. If we are trying to teach our students to interpret and impact God's world, we should be invested in the same process ourselves. We are trying to interpret the experiences of remote learning. We are trying to make lemonade!

BOARD REPORT

There have already been a few staff changes since September due to a maternity leave and an extension of a current maternity leave. The Education/HR committee conducted interviews and recommended applicants to the board to fill the positions of Music teacher and a Grades 7/8 teaching position. Julia Duiella Boekestyn will extend her term contract through June 2021 as the Music teacher and we welcome Sharon VanKampen as the grades 7/8 teacher. As well, Amanda VanderMeer has made the formal transition from interim bookkeeper to contracted bookkeeper.

The Fall Membership meeting was well attended in its virtual format. The main focus of the fall meeting is the presentation of the

Independent Practitioner's Review Engagement Report, more commonly recognized as the year-end financial statements for the 2019-2020 school year. As a federally recognized charitable organization the board of LCS has a legal responsibility to present these documents, and invite our membership's response, at an annual meeting. We appreciate those members who watched the recorded meeting and voted to approve the appointment of Andrea Bootsma as board member to fill a vacancy, as well as to approve board actions since the Spring Membership Meeting.

The LCS Strategic Plan Committee was required to change their usual process and wrote a working bridge year plan. They will focus on three board directed areas: a review of the membership process, a review of the finance structure, and completion of the Capital Campaign and review of the Drive. The committee will be looking for community input for a new Strategic Plan when larger gatherings are once again a possibility.

Regular board meetings include a review of the latest month's operating statement to keep the board apprised of the financial situation of the school. Recent board meetings have held an educational component for board members beginning with an indepth look at the Listowel Christian School Constitution.

The Properties Committee is in the process of obtaining quotes for roof maintenance on portions of the building. This maintenance schedule is aided in part by a comprehensive report submitted by CRD Construction Ltd on all portions of the roof when they completed construction of the facility.

The Executive and Board are once again meeting via Zoom and are thankful this format is available so that we can continue our work for the school. We are also thankful for all the staff and parents and students who are committed to working together through this period of distanced learning. We look forward to the day, hopefully soon, when we can do all these activities, learning and leading, face to face!





We are excited to be a part of the LCS community and enjoy hearing Carina's stories about school!






















