easter REFLECTION

Too often Christians don't make a big enough deal about Easter. Christmas, on the other hand, is nearly the opposite. Christmas has special church services and concerts. It has gift-giving and gettogethers. People spend months preparing for Christmas. Again and again, others will ask, "Are you ready for Christmas?" But no one ever asks, "Are you ready for Easter?"

Perhaps you've never given that much thought, but you probably should. After all, in the grand scheme of things, which day holds the greatest significance? Sure, Christmas is important. God taking on human flesh is a very big deal. But Christmas is important primarily because of what took place roughly 33 years later at Easter. Without Easter, even Good Friday is only a story about a tragic death.

But Easter is the main event that pulls it all together, revealing their true significance.

On Easter the angels in the empty tomb spoke some of the most important words in history: "He is not here; he has risen!" (Luke 24:6) Ever since that day, Christians around the world have proclaimed that same wonderful truth on Easter morning, this one phrase echoing throughout the earth: "He is risen!"

But then, this is not something that we ought to proclaim only on Easter morning. After all, it's often said that "every Sunday is a little Easter," meaning every Sunday is a day we get to proclaim again the Good News of Easter. And every Sunday we proclaim this Good News so that every other day of the week we can live out this Good News.

Let me briefly mention two reasons why this Good News matters: hope and change.

We need hope. Without hope we crumble inside

and life withers away. But Easter is about hope. One of the great promises that Easter gives us is that the grave doesn't win. Death doesn't have power over us because Jesus has defeated it. That's a very meaningful comfort when we have to

say "good-bye" to loved ones. If they believe in Christ, the good news is life isn't over for them. They're going to be with Jesus. And if we also believe in Jesus, one day we will see them again.



Easter also provides us with a very powerful source of strength when life seems precarious and uncertain. Easter tells us that, come what may, there is nothing that can ever happen to us that can take away the greatest treasure we have: life forever with Christ.

We have this comfort and this strength because we have this hope. And we have this hope because of Easter. That's one reason Easter matters so much: hope.

EASTER - A RELIABLE MILESTONE

It seems to me that we are always working toward milestones. There are some set things in life that you can count on and you look forward to reaching those goals.

I can only imagine that for farmers you anticipate the planting season. You know it is going to come, you prepare for it, and when it arrives, you are ready. You are excited and the adrenaline rush motivates you to work through it. Then it all happens again at harvest time. I am sure that accountants have a similar approach for tax season. Churches work on their liturgical calendar with Christmas, Easter, Pentecost, Ascension, and Thanksgiving. Teachers have some of the same anticipation for September, Christmas, March break, June and maybe even report card seasons. You can count on these events, you set your sights and work toward them, and they are highlights in your annual cycle.

This Spring, if not this whole year, was a little different for schools. Some things we thought were nonnegotiable have been re-imagined. Our March break was moved into April - who would ever have thought about that? Despite some initial disappointment, we buckled up and carried on our teaching through March and into April. However, we noticed our absenteeism increased with the normal cold season and some tired spirits. We anticipate April 15 and our April break for a good refreshing break.

Not lost between the originally scheduled break and the

rescheduled break is Easter. Easter is a time for renewal, maybe not the physical, mental or emotional renewal we think about for our March (April) break, but a deeper renewal - a spiritual renewal. In a time when typically dependable parts of our lives become questionable, and we look for milestones we can rely on, Easter makes its reliable entry into our lives again. There to offer us hope, there to offer us covenant promises that are true every day, there to remind us of where and with whom to base our lives.

Easter remains a reliable milestone in our churches, in our schools, in our work, and in our lives. We can be renewed, refreshed, and revitalized through the death and resurrection of our Saviour. Thanks be to God!





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Another reason Easter matters is because it's about change. We all long for change. We want the world to change, yes. But we also want ourselves to change. We can very easily spend too much of our life falling into the same temptations, making the same mistakes again and again. Frankly, sometimes this makes us wonder if change is even possible.

But what Easter tells us is that our new life with Christ starts now. Christ did not rise from the grave to only bring us new life later. No, new life starts now. Listen to what Paul says: "We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life." (Romans 6:4)

Christ was raised that we might live a new life. Now. Change can take place in your life. Now. Christ can give you victory over sins that have held sway over you. Your life can bear, more and more, the good fruit of the Spirit. You can be transformed into a greater reflection of Jesus. All this is possible because Christ has risen, and he's sent his Spirit to work powerfully in your life so that who you are now isn't who you will always be.

You see, Easter matters every day of our life. And yet, too often, we only celebrate it one single, solitary day of the year.

That could change this year, though. This year, we could decide that we're going to celebrate Easter as though it really is the most significant day in history. One of the

ways we could do this is by celebrating Eastertide. You see, traditionally, just as Christmas has been given a season to be celebrated, Easter has as well. Eastertide runs from Easter until Pentecost, and is a time when Christians read through the Easter stories of the Gospels, sing lots of good Easter songs, and offer up many prayers, thanking God for the Resurrection of Jesus and everything that this great event has meant for us and our world.

So, I'd like to invite you to consider how you can celebrate Easter this year. You'll be reading this after Easter, but you're still well within the season of Eastertide, which means it's still very fitting to celebrate Easter. You could read through the Easter stories in the Gospels, and talk about them with your children or grandchildren. You could talk about how their significance and how they've changed your life. You could sing good Easter songs, at home as well as church. Perhaps you could even learn a few new ones. (YouTube has many to offer.) And you could pray many prayers, giving praise and thanks to God for the victory over sin and death that He won on Easter morning.

Don't simply save these things for Easter morning. Let's celebrate Easter in the days and weeks that follow, celebrating it as though it truly is the most significant event in history... because it is.

Questions to ponder: How will you make easter meaningful this year? What can we do to help our children or grandchildren understand the significance of Easter?


