LIVING A LIFE THAT MATTERS

September, I led staff In devotions. At one point in the month, to no surprise of the staff, I mentioned a line I have always mentioned: "Teaching, maybe unlike any other profession, provides us the opportunity every day to impact the lives of many. We shouldn't underestimate that possibility and we should strive to ensure the impact is positive". I've mentioned that several times over the last few years and that concept is what challenges me to be a good teacher, positively impacting the lives of my students.

At the end of the month I read from a book called Letters to My Children. Here Daniel Taylor's son asks if he is afraid of anything. After some reflection, he writes that he is afraid of living a life of insignificance. He is afraid that at the end of his life, he didn't really matter. Taylor too, realized that our lives were meant to matter, and we should live a life that directs people to the eternal rewards offered by Christian faith.

More recently, I listened to a leadership podcast and the speaker said, "Our greatest fear is not that we are inadequate but that we are powerful beyond measure. It is our light and not our darkness that frighten us". That is another way of looking at it. Timothy mentions the power of spoken words (teachers and parents speak a lot) and says that "not many of you should become teachers, my fellow believers, because you know that we who teach will be judged more strictly". As teachers, parents, adults and leaders, we are placed in positions of influence, and often those positions are extremely powerful and character shaping. To be handed that opportunity and responsibility is sometimes frightening. However, with the encouragement of Christ, we are equipped. We should be excited to share the light and not be afraid of the negative influence of the darkness.

As we enter the Christmas season, we celebrate the birth of Christ. Jesus Christ came to live among us, to walk beside us, and to experience life with us. He came to impact lives. He came to live a life that had significance for all those who believe in him. Jesus came to live a life that mattered. He came to shine the light into lives that seem dark. Every day the life of Christ, from his birth, through his death, and then his ascension, has the opportunity to positively affect the lives of any person who will believe in him.

I hope you are encouraged by the gift of Christ's birth and by the model of his life to live a life of influence yourself. Shine your light, the light of Christ, into the lives of your neighbours, your friends, and your family. May this Christmas encourage you to live a life that matters.


