I will admit that I have a very idealistic image of family. I grew up in a family that was pretty cohesive. Sure, we had our sibling arguments but, overall, it was wonderful. I remember dinner times that lasted an hour every night. After eating, we had devotions, and then we just sat around talking, teasing, and sharing thoughts. It usually ended with my brother and I wrestling on the kitchen floor until my dad got out the wooden spoon and broke up the tussle, if it didn't happen already because one of us got hurt. We all had our after dinner chores: clearing the table, washing and drying the dishes, and then putting them away. Everyone participated in some way, which usually resulted in a few friendly arguments. Even as I write this, I appreciate the bonding that happened through it all. Those are the fond memories. However, it hasn't always been easy. There have been tragedies, disappointments, and worries. No doubt, there have been some hard times.
