<u> Junior Kindergarten – Mrs. Baarda</u>

As March comes to a close, so does our Nursery Rhyme unit. We will read a few more fun rhyming stories and poems this week.

Our focus letter this week is letter Ww. We will practice the sound letter W makes and practice recognizing upper and lowercase W.

This week in our workbooks we will begin to review printing the uppercase letters because we have come to the end of the alphabet! We will print several letters each day.

In math, we will be looking at helpful numbers 5 and 10.

In Bible, we will read about "The Good Samaritan" and "The Greatest Commandment".

For our health lesson, we will look more closely at our sense of hearing.

Senior Kindergarten - Mrs. Heida

This week we will focus on the letters Ee and Qq, sort by number of syllables, identify ending sounds and use the listening center. Our new sight word is "for".

In **math**, we are finishing up addition within 10 and will print numbers to 20 without reversals. In **Bible**, we will learn about The Lord's Supper and the Garden of Gethsemane. Our memory work is Matthew 28:5-6a-"The angel said to the woman, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; He has risen."

For Handwriting Without Tears, we will focus on lower case i, e, l and printing words and sentences.

We will read Yertle the Turtle and learn to draw a turtle. We will also read Green Eggs and Ham and taste green eggs....I wonder who will like them? Or who will try them?

<u>Grade 1 and 2 – Mrs. Dykstra</u>

It is fun to search for the hidden resurrection egg! Last week our eggs housed a donkey, coins, a cup, praying hands, and a rooster. What clues will we find this week?

In **Bible** class, we will finish up our learnings on the Lord's Prayer and begin to reflect on the Easter story via reader's theater. The Triumphal Entry is our first story to pause and remember, along with other stories from the first three days of Passion Week.

Language Skills

Full group phonics: We made a good start on diagraphs and will spend another week solidifying our learning with games, listening activities, and small group learning.

Reading: Battle of the books! We are laughing and enjoying the many versions of the Three Little Pigs. We are turning this unit into a "battle of the books," pinning the "fractured" versions of this well-known fairy tale against each other, comparing and contrasting each, and then voting for our favourites. Who will win? Stay tuned.

Writing: Last week, our writing project focused on what writers do: think, draw, write, and label. Students penned a piece entitled "My Spring Break." The goal is to write more by adding interesting details to make stories appeal to the reader. Sharing their writing motivates and inspires students to do more than the minimum.

Spelling: We will show what we know on April 1 (not a joke)! Here are the lists for study (also available on Seesaw and Spelling City).

Orange: phone, photo, shout, brush, chips, child, shape, think

Blue: chin, thin, shin, shut, wish, dish, rush, push

Green: cub, tub, bug, hug, hum, gum, fun, sun

In **Creation Studies**, we explored the water cycle last week. We will inquire about air this week. We can't see air, but God created it all around us. Air takes up space. How might we know that it is taking space? Then we will discuss how God gave us air to make certain activities possible. We also hope to look at the characteristics of water, if time permits.

In **Grade 1 Math**, we will learn to read number words to twenty and write number words to ten. Next is a unit on skip counting. Students will skip count forwards by 2s, 5s, and 10s within100 and backwards by 2s and 5s within 20.

We spent the past week measuring, making rulers, and discovering how we use units of measurement in math class. We have used a number of different units, paperclips, snap cubes, dice are just a few that we used, to understand how we need the same when comparing measurements. We will finish off the unit this week and our first book! We are very excited to start our second math text book of the year. The first unit will be a short one on skip counting, focusing on counting by 2s, 5s, and 10s.

Grade 5 and 6 French- Ms. VanKampen:

So, last week we 'lost' our Wednesday class and we have also lost Monday's class. So...

Last Monday, we began reading a short piece/story that focuses on the "en" sound – spelled "in" (e.g. sapin, lapin, magasin, etc.) and "ain" (e.g. train, main, pain). As we attempt to build on our grammar and sentence building skills, Wednesday's class will yet focus on '-er' verbs, as students are expected to know (or commit to memory) the ending which corresponds with each pronoun or the subject of a sentence.

Looking ahead: students will [independently] complete a written assessment on Wednesday, April 6th on '-er' verbs. The resulting mark will be part of the T3 evaluation. Students with a formal IEP will be given accommodation to complete the assessment.

Grade 5 and 6 - Mr. Siebenga

Good day, Emerson said it well, "Our life is March weather, savage and serene in one hour." I hope it can go out like a lamb, and that the showers of April will start on time. Have a great week!

Onto the plans:

In **Bible**, on Thursday of this week the students that chose to write the test will do so. Also on Thursday, the others will share their brochures that they have made about one of the cities that Paul and Barnabus visited throughout their first missional journey. Later this week we will shift back to looking at the last days of Jesus, which will lead us into the Easter season.

In **Math**, we are exploring fractions, percentages, and ratios. Through manipulatives, practice, and games the students will push their understanding of these concepts to better equip themselves and their number relationships. I will continue to assign tasks through Khan academy, and look for steady practice with basic facts on Fridays.

In **Reading**, we have begun our next novel relating to our next social studies unit on Our Neighbours to the South, the United States of America. The "Underground to Canada," should produce a great lens to begin to explore this country's past, the connection Canada has with these events, and an exploration of family, trust and the evil that existed often unbeknownst to those involved.

The **Passion Projects** / **speeches** are coming along nicely. I have been able to communicate with students that have reached out to have me read and provide feedback to. They each have received feedback from themselves, and their peers. Hopefully these will be shared on Thursday afternoon. Depending on the autonomy of the students, their desire to push their writing and research abilities, and to be ok with where they are, I hope they learn to continue to push themselves and to keep moving forward.

In **Social Studies**, the Provincial Showcase was a lot of fun. Those that jumped into the opportunity came away with a more thorough understanding of the characteristics of our province and the citizens of our diverse province. The presentations, and the role plays were thoughtful, and creative. As time permits this week, we will jump into our exploration of our Southern neighbours, the United States of America. Here are some enduring questions that you can ask your students, and that will drive our inquiries. What challenges does the United States face? How is the US living within the global community? How can Christians in Canada understand, support, and celebrate the United States? I hope that together we can observe how America is a continent, better understand what it means to be neighbours to these United States and that God will help us explore areas that will enable us to better understand and serve Him through our neighbours.
