Everyone makes a lot of decisions in a day. If you Google the question, some sources say an adult person makes 35,000 decisions a day, starting with whether to get up or hit the snooze. Some are not important decisions. Another source says that an adult makes 120 informed, important decisions each day (one about every 10 minutes of an average waking day) and yet another source says that a teacher makes 1,500 educational decisions every day. Based on that knowledge, the number of decisions being made, and the varied results of those decisions, a teacher's day can unravel in many different ways.

And yet, that is also the fun of it. Every day we are provided the opportunity to make decisions to direct our day. What do we think will work best? What will the students like, or better yet, what will enable them to learn best? How do we include variety so that every child has an opportunity to learn and/or shine at some point throughout the day? How do we show God's creativity, power, and love in every part of our day?

I am a numbers guy so let's say I have a good day and 80% of my decisions work well to achieve the intended goal. That is pretty good – 1200 good educational decisions! However, that leaves 300 educational decisions every day that could have been better. 300! Those are a lot of decisions that could have negatively affected someone's day or learning opportunities. Sometimes I don't like numbers. When I think of it this way, I am thankful for a community that believes in God's grace. We are a team working together to nurture and teach our children. Together, we support and encourage one another knowing we are all working toward the same goal. Sometimes it doesn't feel like it is going the right way, but eventually enough good decisions will be made to redirect. We are headed the right direction together.

We will work on illustrating our I See class book.

Grade 1 - Mrs. Dykstra

My hope and prayer was that everyone had a wonderful thanksgiving weekend.

Bible: New memory words from Psalm 105:4 (NIV) "Look to the Lord and his strength; seek his face always." It is up on Seesaw as well. We complete our first unit with the story of the Tower of Babel and try another "show what you know" to get used to the routine of assessment. I have sent home the first quiz with a short note to explain our marking scale in Grade One.

In math, number sense to 10 wraps up this week with a short assessment and then we are on to patterning.

Language Arts - Word detectives unit. It can be daunting for emergent readers and writers to stretch out words. It is hoped that this fun unit, filled with missions and clues, will engage students in that process. Our class got a secret message on Friday, inviting us to join the Super Secret Detective Agency! We don't know who invited us to join; all we know is that we need our clues and missions are on the way.

Phonics focus: continued practice of short a and short e. We are word detectives; when we come to a word we don't know, we need to use all the clues in a word and say the sounds we see. Start at the left of a word and say the beginning, middle, and end sound and then blend it together to say the whole word. We are readers!

Word study: he, look, me, on, was

Spelling words (*new routine*): at, cat, mat, sat, pat, hat, cap, map, lap, nap, tap, sap. Dictation is this Friday. Students need to know all 12 words but I will select 6 to dictate and they can "show what they know." Ask if you have any questions. We have time to practice with various activities in class but some students may need an opportunity to practice at home as well. Chapter book read aloud: our new series is Nate the Great. This connects with our Word Detectives theme. This classic detective mystery series for beginning readers introduces the mystery genre and has a logical progression for problem solving.

Handwriting: We will review capital letter formations.

Creation Studies: Students enjoyed making a map of their desktop, looking down with a bird's eye view. We will study the parts of a map this week and try making our own little map with those components. I have assessed their desktop maps and wrote a little note with the rubric to give information about how I assess work in Grade One.

I hope your family celebrated a wonderful thanksgiving weekend together and that you had many reasons to be thankful. I am thankful that I can teach at LCS and work with your precious children. Our theme for the rest of the month is fall and in language we are also focusing on liking yourself.

Math skills: This week we are still working on our number sense up to number 20. We look at tens and ones blocks, reading number words and solving some word problems. Handwriting: We are moving towards the end of writing capital letters this week.

Writing: This week, we focus some more on the process of writing.

Spelling: We are focusing on the revision of our grade 1 sight word list. You will receive the first part of sight words in an envelope today. Please practice them with your children at home. I will send you a message and link on seesaw this afternoon that will help you with that. Each week you will receive some more words.

Phonics: This week we review long vowel 'y' and start with our initial blends.

Reading: In reading, this week we are reading and discussing the book "I like myself" by Karen Beaumont. We will discuss what we like about ourselves and others. We also have ample reading time in various forms scheduled for this week.

Grade 3 - Mrs. Claus

What a beautiful weekend it was. We have so much to be thankful for. The colours outside are amazing. We have a wonderful school building and community. God is good.

Bible- We are starting a new unit entitled "Forty Years in the Wilderness".

Math- We are continuing to plug away at patterns in numbers. Today, we started using T-tables.

Grade 4/5 and 6 French- Ms. VanKampen:

- 1. Hard-copy assessments completed by Grades 4 & 5 last week are being sent home today. Parents, please sign the document and have your child bring it back to me yet this week.
- 2. This week, we will focus on the calendar: year (l'annee), seasons (les saisons), months (les mois), days (les jours). While review for Grade 6, all students are encouraged to commit these terms/words to memory as well as learning the spelling; note that months bear resemblance in French and English.
- 3. Students are also strongly encouraged to continue to learn their numbers (including matching the digits to the words, not just oral counting): Gr. 4 up to 31, Gr. 5 up to 60, Gr. 6 up to 100. There are many videos online which can supplement our efforts in class.

Grade 5/6- Mr. Siebenga

Grade 7/8- Mrs. Vogel

Thank you grade 7/8 for being patient with me as I was sick the majority of last week. You worked well with the variety of teachers and assignments you were given. This week:

W.W.W. - Analogies set 8 was due today. Working with words formatting will change from this week forward. We are now looking at the Greek and Latin roots that make up so many of our English words. Students will be studying the roots and working with words associated with those roots. Each week the weekly W.W.W. will be due Friday. This week W.W.W. Unit 1 is due Friday.

Writing - Last week students were able to learn and write about the Rubik's Cube. This week we are going to be doing a brief grammar review of capitals, commas, and looking at proof reading.

Guided Reading - We will be read the 3rd of our 4 short stories for this unit and analyzing it.

History - This week students will be taking the knowledge they gained last week and designing the 'armour'/'outfit' of one of the specific types of gladiators.

Art - We are continuing on the sketches from last week. These 5 sketches will be due near the end of November.

French - We continue to quickly move through review material looking at pronouns, making items plural, and dealing with other grammar lessons.

Bible - The apostles and who they were both before and after meeting Jesus will be our focus this week.

Healthy Living - Students will continue to work on our online course and we are going to be working with some cooperative games before starting volleyball.

Gr. 7/8 Science- Ms. VanKampen:

This week in our current environmental unit, we will be learning about:

- 1. the impact of human activity on ecosystems by way of deforestation/desertification, pollution, overexploitation of resources, and agricultural systems/types (i.e. mono- vs polyculture, organic, etc.)
- 2. the Indigenous perspectives on sustainability [2022 addition to unit/curriculum].

Grade 7/8 Math - Mr. Boelens

Wednesday morning we will have our math test on the introductory unit. Once the test is marked, all assignments from unit 1 will need to be signed by a parent. Look for them coming home soon – early next week. Our next unit is ratios and rates. A unit outline for homework will be handed out on Wednesday.
