In the last school I worked at we owned and operated our own school buses. That meant that, among other things, the decision whether to cancel school for inclement weather landed on me. I did not enjoy that part of my job. One advantage I had was that I lived in the city and most of our buses ran within the city limits. On potential snow days, I remember waking up early, turning on the television, checking my computer, and calling a few people to hear their thoughts on the weather conditions. On mornings with a significant snowfall the previous evening, it was easy. On mornings with a storm happening right then and predicted to continue, it was easy. On mornings when we were dealing with a storm that was predicted to come in during the day, it was far more difficult. I remember getting a few of those decisions correct, and I remember getting a few of them wrong.

Last week, we had two of those difficult situations of determining whether to run the buses on days where predicted weather indicated it would be unsafe. Sometimes the predictions actually happen and sometimes they don't. Given the large geographical area we cover with our buses, sometimes it happens in some areas and not in others. To be honest, I am thankful that Newry Bus Lines is making those decisions. They work with a variety of companies and collectively make their decisions. The primary concern for them is student safety.

I think of decisions I make as a teacher. When I plan my classes, I assume that the students and learning environment will be a certain way. If that is all true, my plans work out. If that isn't in place, my plans and my teaching are not effective. The truth of it is, very few people will really know if my planning decisions were good or not.

Last week, I called John Chapman at Newry Bus Lines and encouraged him. They offer us great service with great bus drivers. Sure, he has to make decisions and those are very public and affect many people. Most often, they are good decisions but sometimes they don't quite work out as intended or planned. In those times, we offer them grace.

Grade 1 - Mrs. Dykstra

I'm so grateful to be back with students. Thank you to our guest teachers for filling the gap. Thanks for your prayers that I could feel better. Things are slowly improving for me. Praise the Lord. Spelling words: NG digraph words. Here are the words: bang, flung, sang, stung, bring, king, ring, sing, swing, dong, song, lung, strong. Show what you know for these words will be on Friday, January 21.

Creation Studies: We had one lesson on roles and responsibilities this past week. This week, we will look at the different roles we can have in groups we belong to. We can belong to different groups at the same time. We make a "me" puppet, along with our family as puppets too. We will begin our family crest, seeing ourselves as belonging in different places. Best of all, we talk about how we belong in God's family!

Writing: Our writing is family focused; using our homework pages, we will rewrite our basic family story. From there we will try our hand at writing some sentences.

I Know It - due FRIDAY - "Basic Division with Remainders"

Grade 4/5 and 6 French- Ms. VanKampen:

The two inclement weather days of last week resulted in losing 2 of our 3 French classes. Thus, our current unit will require some additional time. As I shared last week, students have been responding to "Qu'est-ce que c'est?" [=What is it?] and soon I'm hoping to employ "Ou est _____?" [= Where is _____?] where students have to identify the location of a particular classroom object or that of a student using "dans/sous/sur/devant/derriere/à côté de" [=in/under/on top/in front/behind/beside]. In the meantime, this allows for developing an increased vocabulary, and ideally, recognizing what is being asked and then forming short, complete sentences in response.

Grade 5/6- Mr. Siebenga

Bible - As the line of Kings struggled to walk with the Lord, we come to Jeremiah the Prophet. As he is filled with doubt, and fear in these tasks laid out in front of him, may we all find strength in the working of the Lord in our lives, being witnesses to the story of Jeremiah.

Math - Grade 6 measurement tests were sent home, have a look. Make sure to check in with your students. A reminder, the students are working to accomplish one lesson's practice per day. If they need more time, and support, they can reach out, but more importantly, they can bring their books home to continue to work on them. Accountability is being responsible. The Grade 5 measurement test is on Wednesday. Measurement is followed by geometry and the measuring of angles.

Science - With last week's weather disturbances, we hope to get cracking with some energy sources. This quick review will lead to more practical conservation exercises, looking at how we turn on the lights, and what this convenience means for our planet. On Tuesday, Bostech will provide us with a demonstration of what Geothermal energy is, how it works, and how it can support the decarbonization of our planet.

Reading - This week, we will read and discuss chapters 13-14. Remember there is the internetarchive.org to support listening/reading along, as an option. A quiz was taken today to resync ourselves with the story's plot development. Literacy circles will continue to be utilized, as will regular comprehension questions

Grade 7/8 Science- Ms. VanKampen

Last week's inclement weather days resulted in a loss of both our science blocks; last week's plans to deal with the topic of Greenhouse Gases will wait until the week of January 30 th.

As this week's topic is "Heating the Home," we will receive a presentation and demonstration on Geothermal Energy/Heating from Mr. Arnold Bosman of *Bostech Mechanical*. This will use approximately half of our Tuesday science block. To continue on that thread, information on other methods of home heating will also be covered.

The Bible test will now be Monday, January 30. Students have already received a review sheet that they can work from, study off of, and add to as we continue to finish the unit up this week. Art - Our 6 pointed, geometrically designed snowflakes are due on Wednesday, January 25.

Geography - We continue our current unit of study.

French - Students finished one half of our unit assessment last week and will be completing the final written assessment for the unit this week. This should all be done in class and/or at school.

Writing - We continue to work on formatting stories, proofreading marks, and being able to check for spelling, grammar, and word usage in given passages and sentences.

W.W.W. - Again, because of the ice days last week, Unit 10 will now be due this week Friday, along with the unit test. Guided Reading - We were able to watch a video clip last week that helped students to see what crossing the Mediterranean Sea was like for many Syrian refugees like the character in our class novel study. We continue to read through our novel, answer questions, and have class discussions.

Healthy Living - Every student has been updated with what they need to finish for the Everfi unit before the end of February. We have started a badminton unit in Phys. Ed. for the next few weeks.
