





BOARD report

The board has continued to meet monthly to discuss the ongoing operations of LCS. We focus on 4 main pillars; financial stewardship, policy/ procedures, COO oversight and strategic planning. In November, we met with lan Timmerman from Edvance to learn about and discuss what it means to be an effective board. The analogy of a ship, was presented for discussion. He put forth this question: "If the school were like a ship where ought the school board spend most of its time? Should we be loading cargo? On the bridge at the helm? Patching the leaks? Training the crew? In the crows nest scanning the horizon"? We will continue to strive to spend most of the time on the bridge of the ship overseeing the operations of the school and in the crow's nest planning for the future. We are blessed to be able to lead this way because we have a great group of staff here at LCS and a supportive wider community willing to volunteer time and resources.

The board was busy at the end of November conducting the annual budget drive. The goal of the drive was \$105,000 to be directed towards the operational budget. The final tally was actually \$115,000. We are amazed and so grateful for God's faithfulness in this way and for the support we receive from our school community members. We will plan for the Drive to occur in November in future years as well.

In February, staff and board members and their spouses will gather for a fun evening of curling. It's always good to get to mingle with each other in such an informal environment.

We are midway through the first year of our new Strategic Plan with 15 Key Result Areas under review. The Board has been tasked with creating Ad Hoc Committees for several items such as Communications Review, Marketing Plan, and a Review of the Guiding Principles. LCS Committees have begun discussions on their Key Results Areas, including tuition supports and teacher prep times. These discussions have been fruitful, with some improvements in technology and administrative roles already being realized, and some have also taken more time to get started and will continue into the 2023-2024 school year. An update will be provided at the Spring Membership meeting.

With three board members about to finish off their terms the board is starting the process of nominations to replace them. We will prayerfully consider members who possess the needed skills and passion for LCS to make the board as effective as possible.

We have much to look forward to in the remainder of the 2022-2023 school year. We are grateful for your support and request that you continually keep the Board in your prayers.

We give thanks to God for His unfailing mercy and grace as our family has moved from place to place. And we look forward to settling in here for a time and serving Him in this beautiful land.




















