From the Principal's Desk...

This week the message from the principal spot is being shared with the Grade 6/7 class. The students took on a "mission" for earth keeping which involved looking at how much garbage we make at the school and how they can minimize our impact on the environment. The students wrote proposals and then three students were chosen to share their proposals with me.

Composting for a Cleaner Earth at Our School

This proposal is about our mission to help protect the Earth. One of the steps we've taken is saving money to support this goal. On Grandparents Day, people were able to donate, and thanks to their kindness, we were able to purchase a composter.

thanks to their kindness, we were able to purchase a composter. The composter we chose is a spinning model with two sections. It needs to be spun every day, and adding water helps speed up the composting process. We decided to buy it after doing a test: we collected garbage from each classroom and found that a lot of it could have been composted. Just my group alone found 32 compostable items: banana peels, orange peels, apple cores, and more. Instead of going to landfills, this waste could help gardens grow. That's why we believe composting is so important. We placed the composter in the parking area next to the two dumpsters. We chose this spot because there are already composters on the other side of the fence, it's easy to access, and it's away from where kids play. It also won't make the schoolvard smell bad since it's next to

Students will have different composting jobs:

- One person will sort compostable items from the garbage.
- Others will collect the compostable waste from classrooms. Some students will educate their classmates about why composting is important.

 A few will be in charge of spinning the composter and adding water when needed.
We also want to start a Lunchbox Compost Day. On this day, students can compost any uneaten food from their lunches. We'll make it fun by giving a trophy to the classroom class with the most compostable waste. Compost site proposal

We have a proposal for you. Our proposal is about our composting system and where we should put it. We took a walk around the school to look at different possible spots. Compost Mission Proposal

Dear Mrs. Veenstra,

As you probably know we are working on a compost system for our class mission. Composting is important because it helps us become and learn about being Earth- Keepers and caring for God's creation. But this proposal is for the site and where it is going to be. Some students gave suggestions on where our site should be.

There were suggestions all over the school yard. So we walked in groups to see which would be the best destination for our composting system. Me and my group chose one destination easily as a group. This destination is behind the gym right beside the fence. (corner of the school yard). We chose this spot because it has flat level ground for a safe space to work, is not a distraction during classes- but still visible for students to see at recess, it has a good balance of sun and shade for decomposition, and last but probably your favourite, it is not near any classroom for rodents and pests to come inside. The only downside is it is not near a water site but we can solve this by carrying a bucket to the composter.

We also need some supplies, gloves, and shovels. We need these supplies for health reasons, (I mean who wants to touch compost?) and a shovel because you will need to dig through the composter. This will NOT be just a grade 6/7 project. The whole school will have different roles in the composting program. Each class will choose/elect a class ambassador to lead the class through the program telling them simple things like, "This is not compostable" or "This is something that can be reused." Students from our class will educate the classes, but if by any reason a class is not following expectations there will be a student from their class to educate them. Another job is to check bins, making sure that everything in those compost bins is compostable. The last job would be to collect compost and put it into the composter.

Our class will also encourage each class to compost by awarding a Lunchbox Hero. The Lunchbox Hero will get a special ribbon, plaque, or trophy. There is also a reward for the class with the most garbage free lunches. They would get the same prize as Lunchbox Hero. This is important because instead of just throwing our compost in the garbage to be used like garbage we can be Earth-Keepers and save God's creation. Our school can help save this world.




Some of you have been asking about staffing for next year especially in the Student Support Services with the departure of Mrs. Bierling.



- 1. **Compost Presentations & Build Project** Students shared informative compost presentations this week as part of our ongoing Earth-Keeping Mission. Damian and Trey even had a special opportunity to help build a composter with the help of Mr. McDonnell —turning learning into action!
- 2. **Bedtime Story Project Voices That Bless** Students are preparing heartfelt read-aloud recordings of children's books to be shared as bedtime stories for the school auction winner. Through fluency practice and media literacy lessons, they are learning how expressive reading and thoughtful storytelling can really bring a story to life.
- 3. **Capitalization & Grammar Refreshers** This week's grammar focus included capitalization rules and punctuation practice, with engaging mini-lessons and a few competitive activities. Students built confidence identifying proper nouns, adding proper punctuation with particular attention given to colons, and semicolon.
